COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course covers advanced concepts of server-based web processing. Create dynamic web pages by using data from a backend database. Acquire and demonstrate web programming skills through a server-side programming language. Identify and apply server-side programming concepts such as requests, functions, data types, operators, arrays and control structures.

COURSE OBJECTIVES

Upon successful completion of this course students should be able to

1. Write and deploy JavaScript programs.
2. Identify and apply JavaScript programming.
3. Manipulate the Document Object Model.
4. Updating Web Pages with AJAX.
5. Write PHP programs by embedding PHP in HTML.
6. Deploy PHP enabled Apache web server and MySQL database server.
7. Use the MVC (Model-View-Controller) pattern to organize PHP code.
8. Identify and apply PHP programming concepts such as requests, functions, data types, operators, arrays and control structures.
9. Write server side PHP programs to get data from forms.

Assignments (projects) are due on the stipulated due dates, and may be turned in **up to 7** calendar days late with a **25% late penalty**. No assignment will be accepted more than 7 calendar days after the original due date! Students with planned absences, whether for university events, religious observance, or other reason, are expected to make arrangements with the instructor to turn in assignments or take exams before the scheduled date of the assignment or test.

Exam/test dates are on the schedule on the following page — if there are any changes, they will be announced at least one week in advance if possible. A missed exam may be made up only if it was missed due to an extreme emergency and arrangements are made before the exam date. Exams may not be taken early or late due to personal travel plans.
